What in the World is a Liturgical Year?

One of the concepts that tend to puzzle my students is that of the Liturgical Year or The Catholic Church's Calendar, and how it differs from the secular calendar. A good example of the difference between the secular calendar and the Liturgical calendar lies in the New Year. The secular calendar marks January 1st as the first day of the year while the Liturgical calendar, the New Year begins with the season of Advent or the 1st Sunday of Advent specifically, which is always on November 30th or on the Sunday closest to this date. The reason why the Liturgical Calendar differs from the secular calendar is rooted in following the life of Jesus and the portal that exists beyond the physical realm. The Liturgical Calendar is designed to follow the life events of Jesus and the Saints. Thus, the Liturgical calendar has seasons, memorials, and feast days that are tied to Jesus and the Saints. Additionally, the Liturgical calendar has Holy Days of obligations or Days that require the attendance of The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass or what many call church services. For this article. I will highlight the seasons of the Liturgical Calendar.

What is key to understanding the Liturgical Calendar are the important dates and times in the life of Jesus and the Church he established with Peter as the first Pope – (Matthew 16:18). The first important time in Jesus's life is His birth which Israel was awaiting. The waiting for the Messiah is marked by the season of Advent which is four weeks of preparation before the celebration of Jesus' birth. Advent is followed by the Christmas season which is an eight-day celebration of the Lord's Nativity known as the Christmas Octave as well as other feasts about the manifestation that Jesus is Lord of the nations. In the oldest tradition of the Christmas season within the Church, the Christmas Season continues until February 2nd the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord {or Candlemas because the feast is accompanied by a candlelight procession and a blessing of beeswax candles from the home. The Law of Moses required firstborn sons to be dedicated to the Lord, so Mary and Joseph brought the baby Jesus to the Temple for his dedication and circumcision (Luke 2:22-38). Thus, some Catholic households, keep Christmas decorations up until this feast. The next Liturgical season is Lent which is six weeks of penance before Easter followed by the Sacred Paschal Tridium. The Tridium is the holiest "Three Days" of the Church's year, where the Christian people recall the suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus. Following the Lenten Season is the Easter Season which is 50 days of joyful celebration of the Lord's resurrection from the dead and his sending the Holy Spirit. The next season is Pentecost which celebrates the gift of the Holy Spirit which descended

upon the Apostles and Mary and ultimately remains with us today. The season of Pentecost is observed during an eight-day Octave. Lastly, Ordinary Time is one season that is divided into two sections. The first part begins after the feast of the Epiphany and continues until Shrove Tuesday, or the day before Ash Wednesday, and the second part begins the Monday after Pentecost and continues until the First Sunday of Advent.

Lastly, each Liturgical Season a color that is worn by the Priest and is utilized in decorating the Church. Purple (meaning penance) is the color for the Advent and Lenten Seasons, Christmas and Easter Seasons' colors are gold and white (purity, kingship, and glory). The season of Pentecost color is red (meaning blood or Holy Spirit) and the Ordinary Time color is green (growth and new life). Note: During the third Sunday of Advent and the fourth Sunday of Lent the color rose (joy and love) is worn by Priest and other Clergy.

We are human beings which means we are body and soul composite; the Liturgical Calendar is rich with observance that allows us to follow Jesus and ponder upon those things that are soul-enriching and are of the heavenly portal.
