From the Mind and Heart of Deacon Chris.....

I was on jury duty awhile back. Our group was called up to a courtroom and we were briefed that it was a criminal trial. With all of us there, the judge went through a discussion of what it meant to be 'guilty, bevond a reasonable doubt'. He asked, 'what is a reasonable doubt'? There were some legal definitions, but the judge went on to say, and I'm paraphrasing, that there is inside of all of us is that degree of certainty of what 'beyond a reasonable doubt' means.

He explained that evidence will be brought up in this case from the prosecution where they feel will demonstrate that the person is guilty of this particular crime. On the other hand, the defense may challenge the validity of the evidence or have other fact based evidence in favor of their client. If we didn't feel there was enough evidence, or the evidence was just circumstantial, or we weren't truly convinced that person was not guilty of that particular crime; we could acquit. Now, I didn't wind up on the trial, so I don't know how that case ended up; but I remember what the judge said that 'inside of you there is that degree of certainty of what beyond a reasonable doubt means'.

I recently saw a billboard on the Jeffries Freeway that said, 'Beyond Reasonable Doubt JE-SUS IS ALIVE!' So in light of the judge's comments, what does this mean? At the end of St Matthew's Gospel Jesus says to the disciples and ultimately us, "And behold, I am with you always, until the end of the time." (Matt: 28:10) But if Jesus is alive, where is he? Every Sunday at mass we hear the priest says, 'Take this, all of you and eat of it for this is my Body which will be given up for you.' The Eucharist isn't just an abstract concept, some great theological idea, a creed, a moral precept, or a philosophy; it is Jesus Christ, the Bread of Life. Jesus is alive!

Richard Rohr is a spiritual writer; he has written a series of daily meditations and writes. 'The Eucharist is an encounter of the heart when we recognize His presence through our own offered presence. In the Eucharist we move beyond mere words or rational thought and go to a place where we don't think about the mystery of Jesus' presence but we actually begin to chew on it. As Jesus said, 'Eat this for this is my Body' (Matt 26:26) That is why Jesus gives us the Eucharist. In the Eucharist we get touched in an embrace. We receive Jesus in a deeper way than can be imagined. The Eucharist is an essential part of our Catholic beliefs. We can receive the Eucharist at every Mass to allow this personal embrace of Jesus. We receive Jesus with the certainty the judge spoke about, 'beyond a reasonable doubt'; that yes, JESUS IS ALIVE!

Today, March 10, is "Laetare Sunday"

What does that mean?

Laetare Sunday is the fourth Sunday in the season of Lent, in the Western Christian liturgical calendar. Traditionally, this Sunday has been a day of celebration.

It is considered a day of relaxation from normal Lenten rigors; a day of hope with Easter at last within sight.

This Sunday gets its name from the first few words of the traditional Latin entrance verse for the Mass of the day.

Rejoice ve with Jerusalem; and be ve glad for her, all ye that delight in her: exult and sing for joy with her, all ye that in sadness mourn for her; that ye may suck, and be satisfied with the breasts of her consolations

Laetare is the first word — meaning "rejoice" — in the Latin text.
