What is Lent all about? By Mrs. Borg, Theology Teacher-Christ The King School-Detroit

Last Monday, I gave my students part one of a guiz regarding the season of Lent and the Cardinal Virtues of Prudence and Justice. I thought to myself how perfectly the virtues of prudence and justice pair so well with the Lenten Season. Of course, I did not plan it that way as I was simply addressing the primary virtues in the order that I thought made the most sense. It is clear to me now, that God did plan these lessons of prudence and justice to coincide with the Lenten Season. Repeatedly, students would say I need to be prudent about what I choose to do during the Lenten Season, and I need to give to God what is His during this penitential season. Young people are amazing. I think adults often, wonder if young people are grasping concepts, I am here to let you know they are and they are very meticulous in applying what they learn into their daily lives. For example, one student told me, "I plan to give up all meat but bacon for Lent", another student said, "I will add more chores around the house", and another student said, "I plan to be kinder to my younger brother because I will be giving up or fasting from my bad actions toward my brother". In each of the scenarios outlined above, students employed prudent or the ability to govern and discipline oneself using reason regarding what is right and what is wrong. Equally, each student understood God is due penance of some kind during the Lenten Season. In other words, the students encapsulated that Lent is all about spiritual renewal in Christ through Prayer, Fasting, and Almsgiving.

Part Two of the Lenten Season Quiz will center around Holy Week and the Sacred Paschal Tridium. The Tridium is the holiest "Three Days" of the Church's year, where the Christian people recall the suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus. Holy Week is rooted in the belief that God loves us so much that he sent his only Son to suffer, die, and then rise to new life so that we might be free of sin and live with him forever. This belief is at the heart of Christianity.

Holy week begins on Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord. On Palm Sunday we recall Jesus' entry into Jerusalem by waving palm branches and singing "Hosanna". (John 12: 12-16) During Holy Week bishops bless sacred oils in the diocesan cathedral at a special liturgy known as the *Chrism Mass*. The oil of chrism is used during baptisms, confirmation, ordination, and the consecration of altars. The oil of catechumens(persons to be baptized) is used at the Easter Vigil. The oil of the sick is used to anoint people during the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. The oils are then distributed to the Parishes for yearly sacramental celebrations. As part of the liturgical reforms of Vatican II, the renewal of priestly promises was incorporated into the Chrism Mass. The Chrism Mass is an ancient celebration that traditionally takes place on Holy Thursday morning. But in recent years, many dioceses have celebrated the Chrism Mass on an evening earlier in Holy Week so that more people can attend.

Paramount in Holy Week is the Triduum. The word "Triduum" comes from the Latin word meaning "three days," and encompasses the three most sacred days in the Church year. It begins at sundown on Holy Thursday, reaches a high point at the Easter Vigil, and concludes with evening prayer at sundown on Easter Sunday. The liturgical celebrations during the Triduum on Holy Thursday, Good Friday, the Easter Vigil, and Easter Sunday are rich with symbolism and flow from one to another in a seamless way. While it may appear as if these liturgies are separate and distinct, they are intended to be one continuous celebration that commemorates the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus. For this reason, Catholics are encouraged to observe the entire Triduum by attending all the liturgies. On Holy Thursday evening we celebrate the Mass of the Lord's Supper. On the night before he died, Jesus gave us the gift of himself in the Eucharist. (Luke 22:14-23:56). Friday of the Passion of the Lord or Good Friday we recall Jesus' suffering and Death on the Cross. (Jn 18:1—19:42) Jesus' suffering and Death brought about God's gift of resurrection and new life. Holy Saturday morning and afternoon are filled with silence and waiting. We recall Jesus' time spent in the tomb, his descent to the realm of the dead, and God's promise of resurrection. Holy Saturday evening, the Easter Vigil is considered the holiest night of the year. We praise and thank God for raising Jesus from death to new life and we welcome new members into the Church through the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist.

We are human beings which means we are body and soul composite; the Lenten Season like all seasons in the Liturgical Calendar is rich with observance that allows us to follow Jesus and ponder upon those things that are soulenriching and are of the heavenly portal. Patrick was born in Britain about 420 AD, and when he was 16 years old, he was captured by pirates who took him to Ireland and sold him as a slave. He was a shepherd there for a few years and then es-

caped back to his home. He went to school at a local monastery and was ordained. He then returned to Ireland. Irish people were quite spiritual in the sense that they felt the presence of invisible spirits living among the people - especially the souls of the family ancestors. But most people had never heard of Jesus Christ. Patrick traveled through northern and western Ireland, announcing the living Presence of the Risen Christ, and the Christian religion. He became the first bishop of Armagh. He ordained many priests and sent them as missionaries throughout all of Ireland. He died on March17, which is his feast day in the Christian calendar. It is a Holy Day of Obligation in Ireland.
